Cost of Living: Community Support

Household budgets for many people are severely under strain due to the increasing cost of living. The financial strain may also impact people's social connections at a time when many people are already feeling more isolated and lonely, as we do fewer things than we did before that connect us with others.

The financial strain could also make us more fearful of becoming a victim of a crime as the emotional and financial impact of this will be felt greater than before by many of us. These are extremely challenging times for many people.

You may be facing some or all of these challenges yourselves, or you may feel like you would like to offer your support to others - but don't know where to start .

Crimestoppers: Safe Street Campaign

Crimestoppers partners Neighbourhood Watch provide an abundance of helpful guides on the various issues that affect our local areas. Ofcom: Tackling Fake Phone Numbers

Phone users will be better protected against scammers using fake phone numbers, under new rules announced by Ofcom.

A common tactic used by criminals to defraud victims is to imitate – or 'spoof' – the phone numbers of legitimate organisations, like banks and Government departments. If a call to a mobile or landline phone appears trustworthy, people are more likely to answer it and follow the scammers' instructions.

To help combat this problem, Ofcom is strengthening its rules and guidance to require all telephone networks involved in transmitting calls – either to mobiles or landlines – to identify and block spoofed calls, where technically feasible. This will make it harder for scammers to use spoofed numbers.



Ofcom have also issued new guidance to phone companies on how they can prevent scammers from accessing valid phone numbers.

Ofcom allocates telephone numbers, usually in large blocks, to telecoms firms. They can then transfer the numbers to individuals or other businesses. All phone companies are expected to take reasonable steps to stop their numbers being misused, but these efforts can vary.

The new guide sets out clear expectations for providers to make sure they run 'know your customer' checks on business customers. These could involve checking the Companies House register, fraud risk databases and the Financial Conduct Authority's Warning List to uncover information that may indicate a high risk of misuse by the customer seeking to use phone numbers.

Phone companies should also act to prevent any further potential misuse – this may include suspending the number and reporting evidence of fraudulent activity to law enforcement. Read more <u>here</u>

The Jo Cox Foundation: Great Winter Get Together

Each January the <u>Great Winter Get Together</u> brings together communities to alleviate loneliness, inspired by the late Jo Cox MP and her advocacy on this issue.

Starting on so-called 'Blue Monday' - 16 January 2023 - the Jo Cox Foundation is encouraging people to create and advertise local places for events where those who may be feeling lonely can go to form meaningful connections with others.



Loneliness is a hidden epidemic across the UK. 5% of adults feel chronically (always or often) lonely and 45% of people sometimes feel lonely. Despite common assumptions, young people are actually the worst affected, with 15% of 10 - 25 year olds being chronically lonely. The cost of living crisis may exacerbate this by making it difficult for many of us to go along to our usual social activities. With people being unable to afford the costs of social activities, whether that be membership fees, transport costs or simply the price of a drink, there is a real danger that many become more isolated.

That's why this year, more than ever, the Great Winter Get Together will be vital. The Jo Cox Foundation want to both raise the issues of loneliness and ensure that there is a place for connection available in every community in the UK.

This could be anything; an existing, regular event or one which is being specifically held for the Great Winter Get Together; it may be a walk, a zoom call or a coffee morning... anywhere people can connect!

Neighbourhood Watch Network: Burglary Prevention



Taking simple measures, such as locking your windows, leaving indoor lights on a timer, double or deadlocking your doors, and having exterior lights on sensors, can significantly reduce your chances of being burgled.

A combination of **WIDEN** actions is the most effective and recommended by police throughout the country. Additionally, at Neighbourhood Watch we believe neighbours keeping an eye out for each other is also key to preventing burglary.

Click on each area to find out more:

- WINDOWS: Lock your windows
- NTERIOR: Put your interior lights on a timer
- **D**OORS: Double or deadlock your doors
- **EXTERIOR**: Put your exterior lights on a sensor
- **NEIGHBOURS**: Keep an eye out for neighbours





Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service: Public Consultation

Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service have prepared a draft Community Risk Management Plan, detailing how Suffolk Fire and Rescue will reduce and respond to risks in Suffolk.

The draft plan is open for public consultation, and is looking for feedback on levels of response, prevention & protection work, and their people.

The public are invited to comment using the online survey response form at <u>https://smartsurvey.co.uk/s/T5L5A8/</u> The survey closes on 19th December 2022.

Community risk planning is a requirement under the Fire and Rescue Service National Framework 2018, produced by the Home Office and supported by the National Fire Chiefs Council (NFCC).



Appliance Safety in the Home: Register your appliances



Don't take a risk by leaving your appliances unregistered. Be the first to know of any safety repairs or recalls, as well as Keeping in touch with upgrade news. Registration is free and ensures you're on the radar for manufacturers' product recalls and safety updates.

Electrical Safety First: Register your appliances

Each year, Electrical Safety First works with the Home Office to promote electrical fire safety in the home.

Over half of all accidental house fires are caused by electricity, and nine out of ten electrical fires are caused by electrical products.

This winter, more people will be turning to electric heaters, particularly those living alone who are avoiding high energy bills. But using them incorrectly can pose massive risks in the home and can cause devastating fires.

Be safe using electric heaters 1. DO keep them away from flammable materials. 2. DON'T leave them on overnight or unattended.

3. DON'T plug them into extension leads.

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ERA: Top tips on keeping your home safe during Winter

With the winter nights drawing in, and people out much more than we have been in the last two years, home security is now at the forefront of most homeowners' minds.

Put a lock on windows

Whilst we all pay attention to the home itself it is also important to protect the surrounding areas of the home.

Keeping an eye on side gates, rear boundaries and any public footpaths around the house can seem like a big task, but investing in cameras to monitor sheds or side entrances will instantly offer peace of mind. 
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
